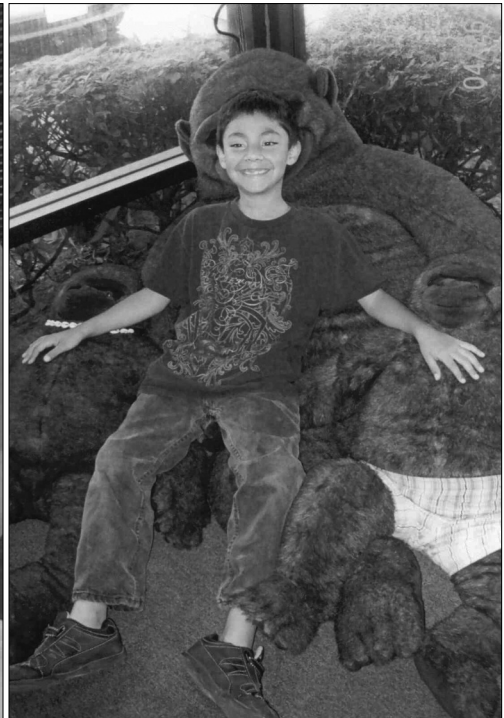
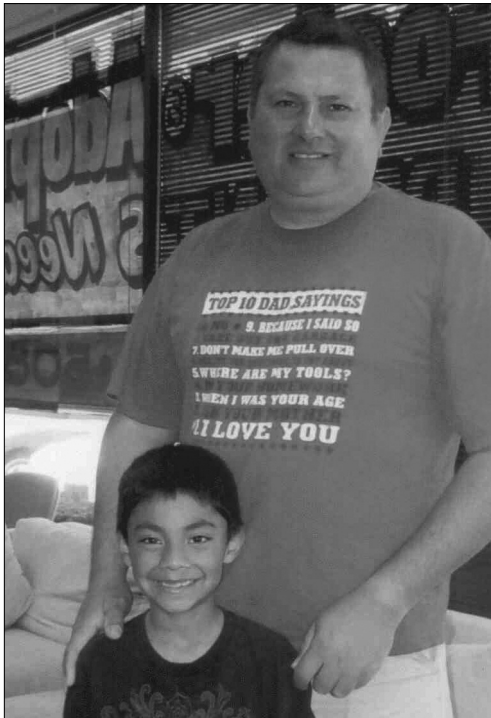

From the President's Desk



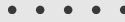

Now reunified with his family, and doing well, he speaks of the Webers frequently and positively. It's great to know that Isaac will look back at his time in an Ettie Lee Foster home with such good memories. Claudia says, "we may not have that many families but the families that we do have care so much about the kids. It makes me so proud to be a part of Ettie Lee."



It's been a long time since we have "employed" one of our residents at the Maine Office. Since January 31, 2011, Luis C., a John Eccles Home resident, has been working as an assistant at the Maine Office. After school, most every weekday, he is driven to the Maine office by a John Eccles staff member ready to work. He has assisted the development department in a wide range of projects as well as making sure the office is stocked with paper and water. At quitting time, he is picked up again by an Eccles staff member and brought home. The staff has reported that he became part of the fabric of the office. "On Monday we talk about our weekends with Luis and he tells us about his," says Vicki, "and when he arrives after school he lets James know how his day went." Then Luis gets down to his tasks. Under James' supervision, Luis has even started to get familiar with Microsoft Word, PowerPoint and Excel.

When asked what he liked best about coming to the Maine Office, Luis remarked "I love to work hard and it makes me feel proud to know that everyone thinks I am a responsible person that they can trust."

We really like having Luis around too! Thank you Luis for all of your hard work.

Luis returned home in mid August and we really miss him.
