Registration Guidelines

If you are no longer a foster parent or care provider and wish to be removed from our list, please call our office at your earliest convenience.

PLEASE PRE-REGISTER FOR ALL CLASSES

In order to provide you with quality training and professional services, we require that all participants adhere to the following guidelines:

PROVIDE VALID CALIFORNIA IDENTIFICATION TO OBTAIN YOUR CERTIFIED TRAINING HOURS CERTIFICATE FROM THE TRAINER.

The following frequently asked questions may be helpful to you:

Do I have to pre-register in order to attend a class?

Yes. There is no way for us to contact you regarding class changes or cancellations if you do not pre-register.

How do I register for a class?

You may register by doing one of the following:

- Call the Foster and Kinship Care Education (FKCE) office at (626) 857-4028 between the hours of 9 a.m. and 5 p.m.
 M-Th and between 9 a.m. and 4 p.m. on Fridays. (Please speak and spell clearly). We observe all national holidays.
- Fax lists of three or more participants to (626) 857-4146
- · E-mail your registration to fkce@citruscollege.edu
- The FKCE office will only return calls if there is a question regarding your registration. Otherwise, clearly providing all of the required information on our voicemail will suffice.

What information do I need to provide in order to register?

- · Your full name, complete address and telephone number with area code.
- All class locations, dates and times.
- E-mail address if you prefer to be contacted via e-mail.

Can I get documentation to certify that I have taken classes?

Yes. The Foster and Kinship Care Education (FKCE) office can provide a transcript of all foster care classes you have taken. Call the office at **(626) 857-4028** to request your transcript and then present a valid California ID when you pick up your transcript.

Is there a fee to attend classes?

No. Our training sessions are free and are open to anyone in the community.

I am not a foster parent or relative caregiver. Can I still attend classes?

Yes. Although our target audience is foster parents and relative caregivers, our classes are open to everyone in the community including social workers, group home staff, family and friends.

Can I bring my children to the class with me?

No. Children are not permitted to attend most of our classes due to topics of a sensitive nature and liability issues. Refer to the class description for permission to bring children or youth to classes.

What if I can't make it to a class after I have registered?

No problem! Just call our office to cancel your seat in order to offer it to someone else who may be waiting for a space.

What if a class gets cancelled or moved? How will I know?

Our office will make every effort to contact you with any cancellations and/or changes. This is why it is important to pre-register and provide your contact information when doing so. Class cancellations made Monday through Friday after 4 p.m. will not provide us time to reach you by phone. Please note that, to the best of our ability, notices will be posted at the training sites regarding unforeseen cancellations.





Youth Subcultures (B or D Rate) Tuesday, July 17, 2012 * 6 p.m. – 9 p.m.

Description: This class discusses today's youth subcultures. Participants learn about three new subculture trends that are on the rise. The class also examines how subcultures have always been an intricate part of teen development and why this is not something new, but something that has evolved. In addition, the class addresses how subcultures affect the behavior of foster youth, and what foster parents can do to cope.

Angry, Hostile and Defensive Teens (B or D Rate) Thursday, July 19, 2012 * 6 p.m. – 9 p.m.

Description: This course assists foster parents in developing skills to understand and cope with the challenges of defiant children. Through group discussion, learn to recognize, define, and articulate behavior surrounding defiance and why children behave in this way.

Life Long Issues In Foster Care (B, D or F Rate) Tuesday, July 24, 2012 * 6 p.m. – 9 p.m.

Description: This class provides parenting tools and knowledge to caregivers, to help foster and adoptive children achieve positive outcomes when challenges arise at home. Participants will define and articulate attachment issues and other long-term struggles for children that are associated with foster care and adoption.



Foster Children and Sexualized Behavior (B or D Rate) Thursday, July 26, 2012 * 6 p.m. – 9 p.m.

Description: This class will explore how foster children may exhibit sexualized behavior. Through discussion, participants will examine how abused children may display behaviors that can raise questions about their sexual behavior toward others. Participants will be able to recognize these behaviors and will gain knowledge of how to better address this situation.

The Truth About Rape (B, D or F Rate) Tuesday, July 31, 2012 * 6 p.m. – 9 p.m.

Description: This class will examine the topic of rape. Participants will gain knowledge of some of the myths surrounding rape, its victims, and its consequences. This class will provide participants with indicators that a foster youth may have been the victim of rape. We will explore some of the harsh realities of this coping with the topic of rape.

Foster 420 Slang (B or D Rate) Thursday, August 2, 2012 6 p.m. – 9 p.m.

Description: This class examines the hidden slang of today's teens. Participants will identify three different covert ways teens disguise what they mean to say regarding drugs, situations and each other.

Foster Care Q and A (B, D or F Rate) Thursday, August 9, 2012 6 p.m. – 9 p.m.

Description: This class will provide an open forum for foster care providers to ask questions, share experiences, and learn from one another. Participants will achieve a better awareness that they are not the only ones going through the challenges that foster caregivers are faced with.

Rap Music and Antisocial Behavior (B or D Rate) Tuesday, August 21, 2012 6 p.m. – 9 p.m.

Description: This class discusses the results of current research related to the effects of rap music on various types of antisocial behavior in adolescents. Participants will be able to identify factors that decrease antisocial behavior such as parental guidance.

Sex According to Boys (B, D or F Rate) Thursday, August 23, 2012 6 p.m. – 9 p.m.

Description: This class describes the sexuality issues of boys in foster care. Participants examine, identify and define some unique topics related to foster boys. Through group discussion, participants learn of the at-risk behavior of teens and gain a better understanding of how to work with these challenging issues.

Popular Media (B or D Rate) Thursday, August 30, 2012 6 p.m – 9 p.m.

Description: Participants explore how media influences so many components of our youth's lives. We will discuss some of the recent trends of media outlets, such as magic, advertisements, video games and reality TV. Learn of the ways which media both positively and negatively affect the everyday lives of our foster youth.



Understanding Sexual Orientation: GLBTQ (B or D Rate) Tuesday, September 4, 2012 6 p.m. – 9 p.m.

Description: What does GLBTQ mean exactly? How do children have any idea about their sexual orientation: they're only kids, right? Participants will have an opportunity to explore issues, questions, and concerns about what it means to be gay, lesbian, bi-sexual, or transgendered, and how this impacts youth in care. Participants will also discuss how this impacts their roles as foster parents.

Children Who Self Abuse (B, D or F Rate) Thursday, September 6, 2012 6 p.m – 9 p.m.

Description: There are many behaviors that foster and adopted children display that baffle caregivers, teachers, and parents alike. This class provides caregivers with an understanding of why children hurt themselves and gives insight into self abuse. Learning effective coping skills/tools will enable children to lead more successful lives.

The Art of Negotiation, Problem Solving and Influencing Others (B Rate) Tuesday, September 11, 2012 6 p.m. – 9 p.m.

Description: Why is working with my children always a battle? They don't do their chores, homework, or get along with each other! When will the madness stop? Participants learn skills needed to negotiate, problem solve, and build cooperation in their homes, without creating chaos. Participants have an opportunity to participate in a family/group meeting and develop real solutions to everyday frustrations with their children.

Working with Sexual Identity Issues (B or D Rate) Tuesday, September 25, 2012 6 p.m. – 9 p.m.

Description: This workshop will discuss the issues facing youth who need our protection because of their sexual orientation. Many people have strong feelings regarding sexual orientation, but as caregivers we need to help our children feel safe and follow the law (AB458) which states that youth should not endure abuse and harassment in foster care. Caregivers will understand how to provide the same safe and caring environment needed by all youth and will discuss ways to be more accepting of lesbian, gay, bi-sexual, and transgendered youth who need the same support and guidance as they develop as any child. Caregivers will be able to identify services and social activities that may help these children feel less isolated.

Homophobia in Middle School (B or D Rate) Thursday, September 27, 2012 6 p.m. – 9 p.m.

Description: Participants will learn to recognize when a youth is using homophobic verbiage toward another youth. Participants will define homophobia and the effects it has on the environment. Homophobia will be discussed collectively to assist the process of understanding the ramifications of homophobia on the foster home, school, peers, family and society. The session also examines the reality of hate crimes and the consequence of words.

The Person in the Mirror (B, D or F Rate) Tuesday, October 2, 2012 6 p.m. – 9 p.m.

Description: In this class participants will take an in-depth look at their personal stories and their transitions into becoming kinship/foster caregivers. Participants will explore, examine, and identify their strengths and needs as kinship and foster caregivers. They will discuss events and experiences that influence their decisions to become caregivers. The class will focus on three key elements of caregiving as foster/kinship parents: "The Exit, The Entrance and The Existence."

Pink is for Girls and Blue is for Boys (B, D or F Rate) Thursday, October 4, 2012 6 p.m. – 9 p.m.

Description: This workshop will provide resources and explore the taboos of sexuality and gender and how they affect children's lives. Topics to be discussed are safety, inclusion, and bias. Participants will be able to identify the safety, inclusion, and bias issues involving sexual taboos.

Preparing for the Holidays (B Rate) Tuesday, October 9, 2012 6 p.m. – 9 p.m.

Description: Many youth have experienced abuse and broken promises during holiday seasons in the past. The possibility of seeing family members brings a wide variety of feelings including joy, anxiety, anger and sadness. Learn how to help you and your child survive the holidays together.



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Presenter: Corrine Garcia, A.A.

Sex, Alcohol, Drugs and Rock N' Roll (B, D or F Rate) Thursday, October 11, 2012 6 p.m. – 9 p.m.

Description: This class will discuss the reality that many of our foster youth come into our care having already experienced: drug addiction, alcohol abuse, sex, and the behaviors related to these activities. Through discussion, participants will examine how today's children, including those with emotional and behavioral issues or who are medically fragile, have adopted drugs, sex and alcohol as a coping device for dealing with life's tough situations. This class will help caregivers educate their youth on preventions for "at-risk behaviors" that might lead to catching a disease or harming themselves. This course will provide participants with tools for addressing these issues.

Self-Sabotage and Foster Youth (B Rate) Tuesday, October 16, 2012 6 p.m. – 9 p.m.

Description: Self sabotage... What is it? How does it affect youth in the foster care system? This training will discuss and identify self-sabotaging behaviors displayed by youth while also addressing why these behaviors begin. Caregivers will learn ways to assist youth in recognizing these behaviors and empowering them to change.

Children In Crisis Who Have Parents in Prison (B or D Rate) Thursday, October 18, 2012 6 p.m. – 9 p.m.

Description: This course will discuss and list the various losses and challenges children who have parents in prison face. Caregivers will be able to identify resources to their foster youth.

Working with Ethnic Hair (B Rate) Tuesday, October 23, 2012 6 p.m. – 9 p.m.

Description: It is important for foster and adoptive parents to learn basic black hair care. With proper education, the right technique, and, most importantly, the right products, you can master the art of caring for ethnic hair. This workshop will educate and teach caregivers on the proper care of ethnic hair. Participants will gain an understanding of how ethnic hair care contributes to a child's self esteem, self-identity, and promotes cultural sensitivity and awareness.

The Great Me (B, D or F Rate) Thursday, October 25, 2012 6 p.m. – 9 p.m.

Description: This course describes various techniques caregivers need to be aware of to help their youth. Participants will identify and define various interactive techniques to help foster youth recognize their talents and abilities. Through group discussion, participants will role play the techniques to help youth recognize their talent.

A Blend of Different Roots: Cultural Awareness and Sensitivity (B Rate) Tuesday, October 30, 2012 6 p.m. – 9 p.m.

Description: This course discusses the various cultures and ethnicities we deal with on a daily basis and how to be sensitive when working with them. Discussion focuses on cultural norms, foods, mannerisms, customs, heritage roots and genetic blends from parents of different origins. It is important that caregivers are able to recognize that most multi-racial individuals want to embrace and celebrate all of their ethnicities.



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Managing the Angry and Aggressive Moments in Life (B, D or F Rate) Tuesday, July 17, 2012 * 6 p.m. – 9 p.m.

Description: This class will discuss anger management techniques. Participants will have the opportunity to examine their relationship with anger, identify positive and negative/maladaptive coping skills and their implications. Participants will understand the importance of modeling appropriate anger management skills, and will be able to list potential outcomes of unresolved anger, especially with children who are medically fragile and/or have emotional and behavioral issues.

Presenter: Becky Schaal, B.S.

Unique Challenges of Raising Boys in Today's World (B Rate) Wednesday, July 18, 2012 9 a.m. – 12 p.m.

Description: Boys often respond well to shortterm goals. However, it can be difficult to motivate boys more so than girls. In this class, participants learn how gender is an important factor affecting development. Boys and girls have different strengths and will develop differently physically, intellectually and socially. Presenter: Sandra Browne, M.A.

Inhalants Teens Use to Get High (B or D Rate) Thursday, July 19, 2012 * 6 p.m. – 9 p.m.

Description: In this class, participants will learn about the things that teens use to get high. You will be surprised to find out how many household items teens can use for this purpose. Come and learn how to identify some of these things and how to appropriately handle this matter.

Presenter: Becky Schaal, B.S.

Boundaries (B, D or F Rate) Sunday, July 22, 2012 10 a.m. – 3:30 p.m.

Description: Participants examine why it is important to establish appropriate emotional boundaries with their children. Participants develop strategies to establish positive boundaries with their children.

Presenter: Rod Recendez, B.A.

Grief and Loss (B, D or F Rate) Thursday, July 26, 2012 9 a.m. – 12 p.m.

Description: Many children in foster care suffer from grief and loss. Join us for an insight on how you can support the children in your care who are faced with these circumstances. Caregivers discuss why kids grieve in foster care and identify techniques to help children overcome their losses.

Presenter: TaWanna Smith, M.A.

Talking to Youth About Sex (B Rate) Thursday, August 2, 2012 6 p.m. – 9 p.m.

Description: Talking about sexuality with your teenager is not easy, but it is important to help him or her develop healthy attitudes toward sex and to learn responsible sexual behavior. Openly discussing sex with your teen also enables you to provide accurate information. This class teaches caregivers skills to use when talking with their youth. Participants engage in role play to rehearse how to have an effective discussion.

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Learning About Students with Emotional or Behavioral Disorders At School (B or D Rate) Saturday, August 4, 2012 * 9 a.m. – 3 p.m.

Description: You may ask yourself, "Why does my child get in so much trouble at school? Is he/she a bad student? Does he do it on purpose?" Behavioral disorders become apparent when the student displays a repetitive pattern of disturbing behaviors that result in a negative impact on their peers. Displaying such disturbances can significantly affect impairments in academic and social functioning. In this workshop, participants will identify and establish clear expectations about appropriate behavior for their foster youth. They will discuss interventions needed to help youth succeed academically, especially in the classroom. Participants will be able to recognize resources available by school districts such as the IEP or special education classes. Participants will also learn to display appropriate behaviors that they can model to their youth when stressful situations occur in the school setting. Presenter: Lucy Razo

Developing A Self Control Plan (B, D or F Rate) Sunday, August 5, 2012 10 a.m. – 3:30 p.m.

Description: Self-control or self-discipline is an important element of one's personality. One who does not have a disciplined and controlled approach to life can never succeed in this world of heavy competition. Developing self-control requires patient understanding of the current psychological situation of the self. This class describes alternative skills for parents and youth to use in developing a self-control plan. Participants learn how to understand their youth with a self-control plan in place. **Presenter:** Rod Recendez, B.A.

Why Do the Youth We Care for Steal? (B or D Rate) Thursday, August 9, 2012 * 9 a.m. – 12 p.m.

Description: Sometimes foster parents may experience situations in which the youth they care for steal. In this class, caregivers learn to help the child identify when and where he feels like stealing. It is important to look at the reasons behind the stealing. By reviewing the child's history, which often helps us have a better understanding, caregivers will recognize that a certain amount of "stealing" is normal, especially before the age of three. Participants will learn to teach the child to assert himself to prevent stealing.

Peer Pressure and Self-Esteem (B Rate) Tuesday, August 14, 2012 * 6 p.m. – 9 p.m.

Description: Kids are faced with a lot today. They are easily influenced by friends, peers, clothing, music, physical appearance, and cliques. Raising children in today's society provides many more challenges than when we adults were growing up. Participants will learn ways to strengthen communication with their children and ways to help them navigate peer pressure and strengthen their self esteem. **Presenter:** Becky Schaal, B.S.

Preparing for School (B or D Rate) Wednesday, August 15, 2012 9 a.m. – 12 p.m.

Description: This class informs foster parents of the steps to take to prepare for the new school year. **Presenter:** Sandra Browne, M.A.



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Understanding Teens (B Rate) Thursday, August 16, 2012 * 6 p.m. – 9 p.m.

Description: This class will explore the journey of our teens and attempt to understand what makes them so remarkable. We will discuss our experiences in working with them and how to better understand the pressure of today's teens. **Presenter:** Rod Recendez, B.A.

Sex, Alcohol, Drugs and Rock 'N' Roll (B, D or F Rate) Saturday, August 18, 2012 * 9 a.m. – 3 p.m.

Description: This class will discuss the reality that many of our foster youth come into our care having already experienced drug addiction, alcohol abuse, sex, and the behaviors related to these activities. Through discussion, participants will examine how today's children, including those with emotional and behavioral issues or who are medically fragile, have adopted drugs, sex and alcohol as a coping device for dealing with life's tough situations. This class will help caregivers educate their youth on preventions for "at-risk behaviors" that might lead to catching a disease or harming themselves. This course will provide participants with tools for addressing these issues. **Presenter:** Lucy Razo

Dealing with Aggressive Youth (B, D or F Rate) Sunday, August 19, 2012 10 a.m. – 3:30 p.m.

Description: It is important that we understand aggressive behavior in children and youth in order to reduce it. Aggressive adolescents usually lack the social skills required to solve problems appropriately, such as the ability to express their feelings or take responsibility for their own actions. Fortunately, early intervention and treatment can significantly reduce the risk of harmful outcomes. In this class, participants discuss the difficult subject of dealing with aggressive youth. We explore how to cope with hostile situations. In a workshop setting, we share our best and worst cases with each other and together, we will come up with a plan of action.

Attachment Helps the Child (B, D or F Rate) Tuesday, August 21, 2012 * 9 a.m. – 12 p.m.

Description: Examine the importance of healthy bonding relationships and attachment as it pertains to our foster children. Explore the negativity, stress and frustrations our foster children have to overcome when dealing with their issues of self-worth. Identify healthy steps to building attachment with your children. **Presenter:** Sandra Browne, M.A.

Understanding Mental Illness as it Impacts Life (B or D Rate) Thursday, August 23, 2012 * 9 a.m. – 12 p.m.

Description: Participants will be able to recognize and identify common characteristics of mental illness, and especially how it affects children who have emotional or behavioral issues or are medically fragile. Participants will examine and discuss how mental illness impacts the lives of the children in their care. **Presenter:** TaWanna Smith, M.A.

Helping Children Deal with Stress (B or D Rate) Thursday, August 23, 2012 * 6 p.m. – 9 p.m.

Description: In this class participants will learn what happens when children are stressed out and how it affects overall health. Learn the signs and symptoms of a child that is dealing with stress and learn composure techniques that will help children cope and manage stress. **Presenter:** Becky Schaal, B.S.



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Playful Parenting (B Rate) Wednesday, August 29, 2012 9 a.m. – 12 p.m.

Description: The bond between parent and child is extremely important. Parents and their children often live in very different worlds. For kids, play is their job. Play helps a child to better understand the world. Children can try on adult roles and skills in a safe environment. Through play, children develop confidence. Caregivers will identify appropriate play techniques they can do with their children. **Presenter:** Sandra Browne, M.A.

Bullying Behaviors (B, D or F Rate) Thursday, August 30, 2012 6 p.m. – 9 p.m.

Description: This class examines the causes and effects of bullying. Learn how to prevent your child from being the bully and/or the victim of a bully. Legal and ethical issues, so the child in your care does not fall prey to this behavior, will be presented.

Presenter: Rod Recendez, B.A.

Fetal Alcohol Syndrome Spectrum Disorder (FAS) (D or F Rate) Thursday, September 6, 2012 9 a.m. – 12 p.m.

Description: This class discusses the causes, effects, intervention, and treatment available for the children diagnosed with this disease. Participants discuss some of the symptoms associated with the syndrome. **Presenter:** TaWanna Smith, M.A.

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Eating Disorders (B or D Rate) Sunday, September 9, 2012 10 a.m. – 3:30 p.m.

Description: Participants will discuss and analyze common eating disorders among children. Participants develop strategies to deal with children who have eating disorders, and will learn of resources available in the community. **Presenter:** Rod Recendez, B.A.

The Path of Foster Youth: Hear Their Voices As They Walk Us Through Their Experiences (B or D Rate) Tuesday, September 11, 2012 9 a.m. – 12 p.m.

Description: Many foster youth have been placed in multiple homes. In this class, we will listen to the voices of foster youth while in care. There will be many questions and answers about the experiences they go through. Caregivers will learn how to respond and address the needs of foster youth. They will learn how to access resources available for them. **Presenter:** Sandra Browne, M.A.

Why is Time Management Important? (B or D Rate) Friday, September 14, 2012 6 p.m. – 9 p.m.

Description: People need a clear idea of how they are using their time and how to prioritize responsibilities and engagements. When working with foster youth, time management is essential. There are many scheduled appointments that come with caring for foster youth. There are a variety of time schedules that can fit different personalities, and caregivers will recognize which one fits them best. They will learn to help their youth manage and prioritize their schedules.

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Tantrums and Encouraging Responsible Behavior (B, D or F Rate) Saturday, September 15, 2012 9 a.m. – 3 p.m.

Description: Some children throw tantrums while others never do. Children throw tantrums as a way of expressing anger and frustration. If the behavior is dealt with incorrectly, the child may learn to use tantrums to manipulate people and to gain attention. In dealing with tantrums, the ultimate goal is to teach the child acceptable ways of expressing anger. Caregivers will learn how to acknowledge the child's frustration, and help the child put their feelings into words. **Presenter:** Lucy Razo

Understanding the Need for Boundaries (B, D or F Rate) Thursday, September 20, 2012 6 p.m. – 9 p.m.

Description: This class will define what boundaries are, how to implement them, and why they are so important. We will examine and discuss attitudes related to boundary setting, so that foster parents can better understand how, when and why boundary setting is needed. **Presenter:** Becky Schaal, B.S.

Teaching Social Skills (B, D or F Rate) Saturday, September 22, 2012 9 a.m. – 3 p.m.

Description: Why is it important to teach social skills to youth? Caregivers must have a clear conception of what constitutes social behavior and social skills. Caregivers will identify why a youth engages in a particular behavior or activity in a given situation in order to have some effect on his or her surroundings. It is important to teach and discuss with youth how to integrate their behavior with others in a positive environment.


Teens and Sex: How Times Have Changed (B, D or F Rate) Sunday, September 23, 2012 10 a.m. – 3:30 p.m.

Description: Through the course of this class, participants examine the importance of getting involved with their child's education, especially when their children have learning disabilities and/or emotional and behavioral issues. They identify the barriers, recognize the steps needed to be effective and learn how to receive early intervention through the school as it pertains to their child's educational goals. **Presenter:** Sandra Browne, M.A.

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Identifying Triggers: Why? When? Who? What? (B, D, F or W Rate) Thursday, September 27, 2012 6 p.m. – 9 p.m.

Description: There are behavioral indicators that serve as a red flag for potential at-risk youth. A variety of social and economic factors can contribute to violent and aggressive behavior by children at home, in school, and in the community. Managing anger is something everyone needs to do in a healthy and productive manner. This class presents information that addresses emotional issues for foster parents to learn to manage anger in a positive manner. Participants learn what a trigger is and why our foster children have such a hard time coping with situations that set them off. We discuss techniques to learn how to understand what works and what doesn't. Presenter: Rod Recendez, B.A.

Understanding Your Toddler (B or W Rate) Friday, September 28, 2012 6 p.m. – 9 p.m.

Description: This course will discuss the importance of consistency and attachment in infancy. Learn how to enjoy "the terrible twos!" Participants will be able to identify life stage development from ages 2 to 3, verbalize three developmental tasks for this age group, understand the importance of attachment, and identify at least two activities that they can engage their toddler in, in an effort to increase the happiness of the child.

Letting Go of the Pain (B or D Rate) Wednesday, October 3, 2012 9 a.m. – 12 p.m.

Description: This class discusses grief and loss. Participants learn the difference phases of grief and loss that affect foster youth. Participants identify at least three phases of grief and loss, recognize how grief can lead to acting out, and gain resources on how to cope with this issue.

What to Know About the IEP (Individualized Education Plan) for a Foster Youth (B, D or F Rate) Saturday, October 6, 2012 9 a.m – 3 p.m.

Description: Participants identify various techniques to help foster youth understand a school's approach toward an individualized education plan for special needs students. **Presenter:** Lucy Razo

Gang Affiliation: A Sense of Belonging (B, D or F Rate) Sunday, October 7, 2012 10 a.m. – 3:30 p.m.

Description: Gangs have been around for over fifty years! Why do they still have such appeal to our foster youth? Participants learn how to understand some of the myths about gang affiliations and why so many of our foster youth want to belong. Participants identify common issues regarding foster youth and how their involvement in gangs impacts their lives. **Presenter:** Rod Recendez, B.A.

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Working With Attachment Disorders (B, D or F Rate) Thursday, October 11, 2012 9 a.m. – 12 p.m.

Description: It is important to work well with professionals in order to provide the best possible placement for the children. This class provides information on how to get the team working together.

Emancipation Skills: Helping Adolescents Become Independent (B or D Rate) Tuesday, October 16, 2012 6 p.m. – 9 p.m.

Description: What is emancipation? How do I foster independence in my youth? What things are important for them to know? In this class, participants will identify and discuss several situations that affect youth as they approach their emancipation date. In this class, ethnic, cultural and family values will be discussed to help youth recognize what techniques they should use to help meet their needs. Presenter: Becky Schaal, B.S.

Fetal Alcohol Syndrome Spectrum Disorder (FAS) (D or F Rate) Thursday, October 18, 2012 6 p.m. – 9 p.m.

Description: This class discusses the causes, effects, intervention, and treatment available for the children diagnosed with this disease. Participants discuss some of the symptoms associated with the syndrome.



This workshop is based on Howard Gardner's theory that we each have different intelligences (there could be as many as 10-12) that we draw from when we learn, play and work; sometimes we use one kind of intelligence more than another. Gardner's studies indicate that the intelligences can be increased by providing the right conditions to promote development and by removing obstacles that hinder development. Participants will identify how each learning style processes and filters information; distinguish the personal, internal learning processes that direct behavior; and will effectively recognize the multiple intelligences and the benefits that each intelligence brings to the global society.



California Child Care: Pediatric CPR/First Aid

Los Angeles County Care Rates

B-Rate: The B-Rate is referred to as the Basic Foster Care Maintenance.

D-Rate: The D-Rate is for children who exhibit severe and persistent emotional and behavioral problems. You must be a foster parent who has been licensed for at least two years or directed by DCFS to take this training in order to be considered for D-Rate certification. The Department of Mental Health assesses these children for a D-Rate classification. The foster parents must be referred by a DCFS Child Social Worker (CSW) in order to attend the D-Rate Pre-Service Training.

The foster parent must then complete the 16-hour D-Rate Pre-Service Training Program in order to qualify, and to receive the D-Rate incentive for the incurred cost of the child/ren.

F-Rate: Foster parents must have at least two years of experience as a foster parent and must be referred by the DCFS social worker in order to qualify for the training. Each foster parent will be certified by the DCFS Medical Placement Unit to complete the 16-hour F Rate

Pre-Service Hours: D-Rate 16 • F-Rate 16 • W-Rate 16

In Service Hours: D-Rate 18 • F-Rate 12 • W-Rate 4

Pre-Service Training program. Upon completing the training, they will be eligible to receive the F-Rate incentive to cover the extraordinary costs incurred while providing services to the children in their care. DCFS approval must be obtained before new or additional children with special medical conditions can be placed in their foster homes.

W-Rate: A Whole Family Foster Home provides care for a teen parent and her/his non-dependent child, and is specifically recruited and trained to assist the teen parent in developing the skills necessary to provide a safe, stable, and permanent home. During the certification, we will complete the Shared Responsibility Plan (SRP); discuss caring for the developing teen and baby, discuss roles, rights, and responsibilities of teen parents and caregivers; provide information on available tools and resources, and discuss DCFS policies and compensation.

Healthy News – Growing Healthy Bones!

Young children grow at a rapid rate. A healthy diet and plenty of activity will help them grow to be strong and vigorous. The growth of healthy bones is important to a young child's overall health. Strong bones are the framework for growing muscles; they protect the heart, lungs, brain and other organs from injury and they store vital minerals needed for the body's healthy functioning.

Why is childhood an important time for bone development?

Developing good habits during childhood can lead to a lifetime of healthy bones. Bones are always being renewed and a good supply of nutrients is needed for this process. Patterns of regular exercise established in childhood are also important for bone health.

Can diet improve bone health?

Calcium is a mineral that is stored in bones. The body may use the calcium stored in bones for other activities such as heart, lung and nerve function. A diet that provides calcium is needed for a healthy body and for the development of healthy bones. Vitamin D is also important for growing bones. Most children will get enough vitamin D from sunlight and milk in their diet. Children who do not get regular sunlight exposure or drink milk may need vitamin D fortified foods or supplements. Exclusively breastfed infants should get vitamin D supplements starting in the first 2 months of life.

What foods are good sources of calcium?

In the United States, the most common source of dietary calcium is milk and other dairy products. This includes yogurt, cheese and ice cream. However, a variety of other foods are also good sources of calcium such as leafy greens, collards, turnip greens, bok choy, broccoli, almonds, soybeans, tofu, fish and shellfish. Many juices, cereals and breads are also fortified with calcium and vitamin D.

How does physical activity improve bone health?

Participating in weight bearing activities is the most important way to make bones denser and stronger. These are activities such as running, jumping, climbing and dancing. Swimming and riding bikes or trikes are fun and great exercise, but won't lead to stronger bones. All exercise, however, will improve coordination, balance and muscle strength, making falls less likely and preventing breaks. Wearing helmets when biking or scootering can also protect growing bones from injury.

Encourage habits for bone health by being a good role model.

- Be physically active every day
- · Maintain a healthy body weight throughout your life
- Show children that you eat a healthy diet that is rich in a variety of food



Health & Safety

"Shaken Baby Syndrome"

"<u>NEVER</u> shake a baby.....<u>EVER!</u>"

"I didn't mean to hurt him and I only shook him for a few seconds to make him stop crying!" Infants and young children up to age five are susceptible to head trauma because their neck muscles are weak and cannot always support the size of their heads. Sudden shaking motion causes the baby's fragile brain to slam against the skull wall, causing severe damage or death. Shaking a baby is extremely dangerous. In fact, almost 25 percent of shaken baby syndrome victims die.

Damage to a child's brain from shaking can affect many different parts of the child's body and these effects can be devastating! They include:

Dyslexia



- Mental retardation and
- other learning disabilities

There are many things you can do to prevent Shaken Baby Syndrome:

- Be patient ~ your stress adds to the baby's stress!
- Set the baby down in a safe and secure place, take deep breaths and count to 10.
- Hold the baby and breathe slowly ~ the baby may respond to your calmness and quiet down.
- Hold the baby against your chest and gently massage the baby's back.
- · Gently rock or dance with the baby.
- With a soothing tone of voice, sing or talk to the baby.
- If someone else is home who can care for the baby, go to another room or area of the house.
- Ask someone else to watch the baby for you; a parent, neighbor, or friend ~ then get away, get some
 rest, or do something for yourself that relaxes you.
- Try to give the baby a pacifier.
- Record sounds on a CD (a vacuum cleaner, hair dryer, or one of the baby's favorite sounds).
- Lower any surrounding noise or lights.
- Offer the baby a toy that makes sounds or rattles.
- Take the baby out of the house for a ride in the car or for a walk in a stroller.
- If you find you cannot calmly care for the baby, or have trouble controlling your anger, please talk to a professional or someone who can help you prevent making a devastating act of Shaken Baby Syndrome.
- Remember: No matter how angry or impatient you feel, Never shake a baby, Ever!

Safely Surrender Your Baby



WHERE? AT ANY HOSPITAL OR EMERGENCY ROOM

What is the "Safely Surrendered Baby" Law?

The Safely Surrendered Baby Law allows a parent or person with lawful custody to surrender a baby confidentially, without fear of arrest or prosecution for child abandonment. This law allows for at least a 14 day cooling off period, which begins the day the child is voluntarily surrendered. During this period, the person who surrendered the child can return to the hospital to reclaim the child.

How Does it Work?

A parent who is unable or unwilling to care for an infant can legally and confidentially surrender their baby within three days of birth. Babies may be surrendered to any public or private hospital emergency room in California. A bracelet will be placed on the baby for identification and a matching bracelet will be given to the parent. The bracelet will help identify the child if the parent changes their mind during the cooling off period. A baby can be safely surrendered 24 hours a day, seven days a week.

What Happens to Baby?

Safely surrendered babies are given a medical exam and placed in a foster home or a pre-adoptive home.


What Happens to the Parent?

Parents who safely surrender their baby may leave the hospital emergency room without fear of arrest or prosecution for child abandonment. Their identity will remain confidential and they will have the comfort of knowing their baby will remain in safe hands.

Who Can I Contact for More Information?

If you, or someone you know, wants to surrender a baby, please take the child to any hospital or emergency room. Remember: No shame, No blame, No names...it's the law.
