Just Like the Tin Man



hen Tim, 14, came to live in Ettie Lee's Diamond L home one year ago, one of his motto's was: Don't Trust Anyone. He was a defiant and angry young teenager who was not able to make it in a foster home-he and his sister were in foster care because their

mother was a prostitute and their dad a drug addict. Tim was doing very poorly in school, smoking marijuana and not bathing regularly. In Ettie Lee's group home, Tim, with the supportive help of Ettie Lee's staff, has been able to address his drug use, his defiance, bring up his grades and maintain his hygiene. "He did not make it easy," remarked Jacqueline

Tim is doing so well that he will begin to assist the staff by becoming a mentor to young men who are new to Ettie Lee's program.

Fuller, Drug and Alcohol Counselor, "but after 4 months," Fuller says, "his heart just melted-just like the Tin Man in The Wizard of Oz!"

This October, Tim, who has learned to be much more trusting especially with adults, will be celebrating his one year Drug/Alcohol anniversary. Tim's grades are up, his attitude has changed and his goal is to be able to live once again in a foster home. He probably will never be able to live with his biological parents. Also, during his time at Ettie Lee, with the encouragement of Ettie Lee staff, Tim has discovered his love of reading, sports and helping others. Tim is doing so well that he will begin to assist the staff by becoming a mentor to young men who are new to Ettie Lee's program. "Tim will play an invaluable role as mentor to other teens in our program," says Fuller.

ast weekend I attended the final California Utah Women's (CUW) luncheon. They celebrated 75 years as a philanthropic organization that has provided millions of dollars worth of time, treasure and talent to Ettie Lee Youth & Family Services. I was honored to be able to personally thank the luncheon attendees during their program.

The keynote speaker was Stephanie Nielson, author of Heaven Is Here. She spoke to us about her miraculous survival of a horrific plane crash that left her with burns over 80% of her body and in a medically induced coma for 3½ months. She talked about the incredible pain and slow journey to recovery. She explained how horrified her young children were when they first saw her 5½ months after the accident. Her baby only 2 years old. That they wouldn't even look at her again for 3 additional months.

But then, she expressed unbridled joy about achieving small milestones—like putting on jeans for the first time. She said that if you have never been close to dying, you can't possibly understand how grateful she is for life, just to be alive.

Stephanie Nielson is an amazing example of Doing Whatever it Takes to Build a Life Worth Living. When I think about the challenges she was faced with—and she overcame them!—I am reminded of the Billy Cox quote above. All of us have control over our attitude and our effort. All of us want to live a life worth living and to help the children, youth and families we serve to do the same. The capacity and potential that we have as an agency is boundless. If we take control of our attitude and effort and do whatever it takes!






